Some had chosen the 'longer' route from Porlock which took them through Horner Woods, a particularly attractive ancient pollarded oak pasture. Back to Porlock in the afternoon and the AGM in the beer garden of The Ship Inn. It didn't take long!

Thursday also turned out fine and dry, ideal for a two-hour stroll along the beach to Minehead to wind down. It seems that no Zenecans trip now would be complete without a trip on a train pulled by a steam locomotive. Minehead station is the end of the line for the West Somerset Railway, so we jumped aboard alongside the crowds of 'other' tourists for the journey back to the start, and a pub lunch before going our separate ways.....until next year, when Ian Stott and Chris Ursell will guide us around the Yorkshire Wolds.

It's always good to see old colleagues. The craic, the banter, lots of nostalgia, the humour and laughter, even the BAA exam on the move without books, all testimony to the camaraderie and lasting friendships.
